## Memorial Silence To Be Observed

### Korean War Fighters Join Ranks of Annual Armistice Day Event

#### ARMISTICE DAY PROGRAM

10:45 a.m. Memorial service, Colonial Room, Bushnell Memorial.

11 a.m. Minute of silent prayer for dead of all wars.

2 p.m. Parade starts from Lafayette Monument, going via Capitol Ave., to Main St., Church St., High St., Ford St., to Trinity and Elm streets.

(Early in the morning, veterans will decorate World War I plaques at Colt Park, and a wreath will be laid at the World War II Gold Star Honor Roll.)

Korean veterans will march in this afternoon's Armistice Day parade, and the dead of all wars will receive the tribute of silent city at 11 a.m. The traditional one minute of silence, dedicated to prayers for the American war dead, will be signalled by sirens after a 21 gun salute is fired from the State Capitol grounds.

The parade, marking the 37th observance of the signing of the armistice in World War I, begins at 2 p.m.

Other solemn ceremonies will precede the parade. Early in the morning, a committee of veterans will decorate plaques in Colt Park in honor of the 21 who gave their lives in World War I. There is a memorial tree for each hero in the park.

#### To Place Wreath

A wreath will next be laid at the Gold Star Honor Roll in memory of the World War II dead. Col. James F. Daley will deliver the address.

At 10:45 a.m., a memorial service will be held in the Colonial Room at Bushnell Memorial. Louis J. Chevallier, past state commander of the American Legion, will be the chief speaker.

Gold Star Mothers will be guests of the committee at a luncheon in the American Legion Home, and they will proceed then to the parade reviewing stand in front of the Old State House.

The parade starts at 2 p.m. from the Lafayette Monument on Washington St. It will go east on Capitol Ave., to Main St., north on Main to Church St., west on Church to High St., and south on High St., into Ford St., then to Trinity and Elm streets, where the units will be dismissed. Cars left parked along the line of march after 1 p.m. will be towed away, Deputy Chief Peter A. Anderson announced.

#### Godfrey to Lead

Korean veterans are asked by Parade Chairman Henry T. Pinchers to report to him at 1:30 p.m. at Lafayette Monument for assignment to a parade place.

The procession will be led down main streets by Police Chief Michael J. Godfrey, marshal; Brig. Gen. Benedict M. Holden Jr., chief of staff; Lt. Gov. Edward N. Allen, Maj. Gen. Frederick G. Reincke and Mayor Cronin, honorary marshals; and Congressional Medal of Honor man William J. Johnston.

Fourteen bands and drums corps will furnish music. They'll include the Governor's Foot Guard, Trinity College, Hartford Public High School and Sedgewick Junior High.

Seated in the reviewing stand with state and city officials and Gold Star Mothers and Fathers will be Mr. and Mrs. William J. Chesky of 22 Atwood St. They will see for the first time four of their sons in uniform, marching with Lt. C. C. Robinson Post, VFW. Mr. and Mrs. Chesky have another son in Korea.

Commanding the escort division will be Maj. Walter E. Burr, who will lead Army, Navy and Marine Corps contingents, the Connecticut National Guard, Trinity Air Force ROTC, and the Civil Air Patrol. Marching for the first time in Hartford will be Pershing's Rifle Co. of the University of Connecticut, under the command of Col. H. B. Hollowell.

The second division, commanded by Maj. Joseph L. Henrechon, will include Boy Scouts, Catholic Boys and Girls Brigades, and the Lafayette Drill Team.

The third division, commanded by Lt. Col. Charles B. Beach, will include the Governor's Foot Guard, Governor's Horse Guard, Putnam Phalanx and veteran's organizations. World War I and World War II memorial banners will be carried by members of the Charter Oak Boy Scout Council.
