The Elihu Burritt Library Team and Teaching and Learning

Each member of the Library Team at the Elihu Burritt Library interacts with CCSU students every day. A large part of the mission of the library is to prepare our students to be information literate. According to the American Library Association, "to be information literate, a person must be able to recognize when information is needed and have the ability to locate, evaluate, and use effectively the needed information". In the 21st century, these skills are very important to students as they enter the workforce. With information being so easy to access, it is very important that students learn how to find credible information sources for class assignments, research papers, and life-long learning.

Many times, Library Team members are called upon to assist students with the use of different computer software products and the printing of assignments and resources that their professors upload to Blackboard. Other ongoing teaching and learning that takes place in the library includes providing the print and online resources necessary for coursework, creating educational displays in our 1st and 2nd floor exhibit areas, offering events such as the E-Resource Fair to supplement classroom learning, and providing a welcoming and comfortable physical space conducive to achieving academic success.

The library's home page (https://library.ccsu.edu/) includes an online chat service that provides students with another way to get answers to their questions from a live Librarian Team member. Students can also sign up for longer Booka-Librarian appointments to meet with a librarian either in-person or online.

Librarians visit a number of academic classes each semester to present lessons on building information literacy skills, in addition to teaching a handful of credit-bearing courses themselves. They visit some sections of writing classes multiple times a semester as part of our embedded librarianship program. The Library Team also prepares LibGuides for our students. LibGuides are web-based online guides on individual subjects that assist students with doing research for their courses.

This edition of our newsletter will highlight some of the teaching and learning activities provided by the Library Team as we strive to meet the needs of our students, faculty, staff, and community members.

Meet You in Special Collections/Archives

+ Class Visits +

Professor Jeanne Criscola from the Department of Design brought two classes to the library this semester:

• Students from History of Design (DES 419) learned about the Polish Poster School of Design and became familiar with the Polish Poster Collection in the CT Polish American Archives. This collection is an excellent representation of post-war original Polish posters covering a variety of topics including tourism, opera, dance, and politics. The political posters from the 1970s-1980s illustrate major political changes in Poland. The collection (below left photo) can be viewed online at the CT Digital Archive website.





 Examining various examples from illuminated manuscripts to contemporary limited edition art books, students from Graphic/Information Design IV (DES 438) learned about the history of printing and bookbinding. These publications (above right photo) can be searched through our online catalog, CentralSearch.

Students from Professor Leah Glaser's **Seminar in Public History (HIST 510)** class visited Special Collections for a presentation about collecting developing community archives such as Connecticut Polish American Archives (CPAA) and its relationship to the Polish community in New Britain. The core of the CPAA collection includes records of Polish American organizations, societies, and institutions, personal papers of prominent Polish Americans, and many smaller collections of local activists spanning several generations.

From the Connecticut Polish American Archives

During the summer, the department hosted an intern from the University of Maryland. Renata Vickrey supervised and mentored Adrian Wiacek, of Polish heritage, who wanted to work with Polish archival materials to learn not only about archival work but also about his heritage. His knowledge of the Polish language was very important in this work. He gained valuable archival work experience including collection arrangement, description, preservation, and creating a finding aid to a collection. 
News from ISAR




Cataloging and Metadata Services, part of the Information Systems and Resources Department (ISAR), is continuously adding material to the library collections for circulation and in support of the university's curriculum. This fall, we processed and added over 360 titles.

In addition to the library's collections, we are pleased to work with the <u>Latin American</u>, <u>Latino</u>, <u>and Caribbean Center</u> (located on the library's 4th floor) to catalog their extensive resources in those areas. Since the beginning of our collaboration in December 2021, we have cataloged over 2,000 titles. These titles are available for discovery in <u>CentralSearch</u>, <u>WorldCat</u>, and in the Latin American, Latino, and Caribbean Center title database collection, <u>Latin American</u>, <u>Latino</u>, and <u>Caribbean Center Collection</u>.

Librarians in the Classroom Fall 2023

CCSU 102: Helping Students Navigate A Complicated Information Landscape

This semester featured the debut of a new First Year Experience Course - Separating Fact From Fiction: Critical Evaluation Skills We All Need. The course, designed by Joy Hansen (Reference & Instructional Design Librarian) and Jillian Maynard (Reference & Instruction Librarian), focused on evaluating sources from all different formats such as social media, visual media, Wikipedia, the news, and more. The students learned how to approach information critically and be responsible and ethical information consumers and producers. In such a fast-paced, information-heavy society, the class aimed to help students feel more confident navigating the information they interact with daily, whether for school or life in general. It was a wonderful experience teaching this course and we hope to offer it again in Fall 2024. -- Jillian Maynard

Research on the Run

On most every Wednesday afternoon during the Fall, librarians offered quick-paced overviews of topics students need to succeed such as using library resources, evaluating the news and political claims, how to use the Zotero citation management tool, ethical uses of artificial intelligence, privacy literacy, and more. Many students were referred to the sessions - offered both online and in person - by faculty members. One student complimented presenters on being so "open to questions" and providing "non-partisan views supported by evidence". AMS 210/HUM 230: Italian American Culture

Dr. Carl Antonucci has an interest in Italian American studies and has published several articles on this area in academic journals. He developed this course and has been teaching it as a humanities and American Studies course. Each fall, the course is offered as an embedded First Year Experience course. The course focuses on Italian immigration to the United States from 1880present. Students examine the Italian American experience from Ellis Island through the Italian American communities of today. Italian American history, literature, food, film and music are included as lecture topics.

Other credit-bearing classes taught by librarians include CCSU 102: Separating Fact from Fiction (see above writeup), DH 100: Digital Humanities and LSC 150: Research in the Digital Age.


... TO THE SUPPORTERS AND DONORS OF THE ELIHU BURRITT LIBRARY!

In 2024, Central Connecticut State University will celebrate its 175th anniversary. The first Normal School in Connecticut, the predecessor of CCSU that was created to ensure proper college level teacher training, was established in 1849 by the Connecticut General Assembly.

However, though legislated, the school was without a geographic home and had no pledge of long-term financial support. The citizens of New Britain stepped-up and started the New Britain Educational Fund to support the establishment of the school in their city. Donors to this fund believed that children in the community deserved a good education delivered by well-prepared teachers.

For the past 175 years, the citizens of New Britain have maintained their commitment to the school/university and its library. And today, support from donors has grown well beyond the city's boundaries. We are very grateful for everyone's commitment to public education and their continued support!

RECENT DONATIONS OF BOOKS AND ARCHIVAL MATERIALS THAT GREATLY ENRICH THE SPECIAL COLLECTIONS AND ARCHIVES

- The Connecticut Polish American Archives (CPAA) received a donation of The Dobek Family papers, dating back to mid-1880's in Poland until 2022 in New Britain, Connecticut. The collection is a wealth of information illustrating the journey of one Polish family to the US and settlement in New Britain.
- The GLBTQ Archives received a donation of books and papers from John Loughery, which will be added to the John Loughery Collection (GLBTQ, 2018.02). John Loughery authored several biographies available in the library. The newly donated materials are: a copy of his yet-to-be-published book, Cliff Walk: A Novel and a short story about his hometown, New Britain Memory: Reflections on Race, Religion, and Politics.
- Peter Kilduff donated several volumes of New Britain Directories (1901-1917), which contain a wealth of information related to New Britain history. Mr. Kilduff is a former director of the CCSU University Relations office, CCSU alumnus, and a New Britain resident. He is also an author of several books and articles related to World War I aviation history and an expert on the life of Baron Manfred von Richthofen, the WWI German flying ace.
