Connecticut OER Grant Program Accepting Applications

The Connecticut Open Educational Resources (OER) Coordinating Council is pleased to announce the return of the **Connecticut OER Grant Program** to support higher education institutions' OER efforts in "high impact" areas; that is, courses with high enrollment & high textbook costs for which high-quality OER exists. Here are the categories:

1. **Review** – Evaluate an openly licensed textbook or other open content related to your course(s)/ discipline and write a review for public display.
2. **Adoption** – Adopt existing open course content with little to no changes made to the content (for an indiv. faculty member).
3. **Supplemental** – Develop missing ancillaries for currently adopted OER such as question banks, lecture slides, or lab manuals (indiv. faculty mbr.).
4. **Impact** – Collaborative and course-wide adoptions, collaborative supplemental creations, creation/significant revision of stand-alone instructional materials, and other collaborative, larger-scale proposals.

Applications to Adopt, Supplement or Create OER for courses taught in Spring 2023 are due no later **Friday, January 6, 2023**; and for courses taught in Summer 2023 and/or Fall 2023, **Friday, March 10, 2023**.

Applications for Reviews of OER are due **Friday, March 10, 2023**.

GoOpenCT is a statewide platform for creating and sharing "high-quality, standards aligned, and open learning materials".

The CCSU OER Library team is working to build a CCSU-specific hub on this space.

You do not have to wait for the hub to publish your OER. Log in to the site with your ccsu.edu email address. You may (1) link to your published material or (2) edit material directly in GoOpenCT through what they call "Open Author".

Launched in 2018, the Driving OER Sustainability for Student Success (DOERS3) Collaborative is a group of public higher education systems (including CCSU) and statewide/provincewide organizations committed to supporting student success by promoting free, customizable open educational resources (OER).

Currently their four major areas of focus are Research Priorities, Senior Leader Overview, Equity Blueprint, and Tenure and Promotion.

In the area of **Tenure and Promotion**, DOERS3 has developed an adaptable advisory matrix to help guide faculty as they consider how to fit their OER work into their institution's tenure and promotion (P & T) guidelines. There are seven contribution categories: adopt, adapt, create, improve learning, community, and research. For each category, the matrix suggests the evidence to include in one's P & T package as well as whether the category addresses research, teaching, or service. Here is the *Adopt* section of the Matrix:

Did you know?

According to the CCSU bookstore - in response to the *CT OER Awareness & High Impact Survey* - 57 high impact subject sections used bookstore-facilitated OER (such as TopHat and OpenStax) in 2020-21 .

The same survey reported that 23,779 students across 28 CT institutions saved almost \$2.8 million in one academic year.
